# **WIRES NSW Koala Rehab Workshop**

n the 24th and 25th of September this year, the Koala Hospital in Port Macquarie presented the second Koala Rehabilitation Workshop for WIRES NSW (a wildlife rescue group). We held the first workshop last July and due to a large interest from carers throughout NSW, WIRES asked us to host another workshop this year.

Besides members of WIRES NSW, we also had members attending from Port Stephens Koalas and Lismore Friends of the Koala. There were around 75 people attending the workshop.

The first day of the workshop was the theoretical section with Clinical Director Cheyne Flanagan conducting presentations on different subjects. These included capture and handling methods, admission protocols, ageing koalas, the social structure and behaviour of koalas, bushfire protocols and data collection. She also spoke about the problems that cause wild koalas to come into care such as dog attacks, motor vehicle accidents and Chlamydia.

The assistant clinical director Yon Veenstra ended the first day with a presentation on joey care and the problems a carer faces when taking care of these young animals. The University of N.S.W. Rural Clinical Medical School quite generously allowed us the use of their wonderful tiered lecture theatre, lounge and kitchen facilities for the first day of the workshop.

All the catering was done by the Hill Street Store & Deli in Port and everyone enjoyed the yummy morning and afternoon teas and lunch. We also had the use of an automated coffee machine lent to us from Essential Coffee Group and thanks to Cameron at Coca Cola Amatil for the use of their mobile refrigeration unit.

The second day of the workshop was held at the Koala Hospital, where all the attendees were split up into groups and a few of our experienced

volunteers took the groups around the hospital.

They gave the carers a tour around our facility, teaching them correct leaf arrangement and explaining the layout of the yards. All attendees were very interested in the things we are doing at the hospital, the use of the treatment room and of course the stories about our koalas. Many questions were asked and our volunteers did an excellent job explaining everything.

The volunteers also gave the groups training in the capture and handling of koalas. This was done in the grounds of the Macquarie Nature Reserve and there were no 'live' animals involved. The attendees were also shown a couple of deceased koalas who were dissected showing what happens in the cases of dog attacks, motor vehicle accidents and chlamydia.

# The Good Thing about..... Koalas

ocal writer G Henshaw has teamed up with Port Macquarie illustrator Ben Creighton to create: "The Good Thing about.....Koalas" to raise awareness and money for the work of the Koala Hospital

"It's great to have an accurate, informative book about koalas ... although written with humour it highlights the real dangers facing this sadly threatened species."

#### What was the inspiration for the book?

(G Henshaw originator and writer) "I visited the Hospital as a 'tourist' for the first time about 12 months ago and was so impressed with the passion and knowledge of the volunteer presenter that I thought I could use my writing and marketing experience to create something that could both inform and most importantly raise much needed funds. Some reports I have read say that koala numbers in the wild in Australia are as low as 40,000. They are listed in New South Wales as vulnerable under national environment law. I thought, as a Pommy, that was so sad and possibly not well known by Australians. Certainly unbelievable to overseas tourists. After all what is more Australian iconic, cute and adorable than a koala.?"

#### Are the books aimed at children or adults?

Both. They can be understood and enjoyed by children at four or five but the factual information is aimed at everyone - older children parents and grandparents. Although they are written and illustrated to entertain, education and conservation is an underlying message.

### How did you decide the style for the illustrations?

(Ben Creighton, Port Macquarie illustrator and graphic artist) "I have worked with G on a number of projects over the last few years as he tries to use as many locals as possible when he is in the area. When he mentioned the concept for the Koala Hospital I was immediately sold on the idea. The Hospital does such great work - all through the many volunteers and the money they raise themselves. The challenge for the illustrative style was to combine humour with facts. We did consider real photography but it the exaggeration that characterisations offer. So by over-emphasising facial expressions, situations and perspectives I am able to convey through illustration many emotions. I hope this book raises so much money for the Koala Hospital."

#### Are the books actually factual?

(Cheyne Flanagan, Clinical Director of the Koala Hospital) "When G approached me with the concept I thought it was a great idea and loved the writing and illustrations he was proposing.

The only stipulation I made was the facts had to be accurate. There is so much mis-information written about koalas. It's great to have an accurate, informative book about koalas..... although written with humour it highlights the real dangers facing this sadly threatened species. Raising awareness of the plight of koalas can only be.....a Good Thing."

#### How are koalas faring in the region?

"Not well. The hospital generally has koala admissions of between 200 to 300 each year. That has dropped in recent years... which is a reflection of the huge impact of humans, developments and loss of habitat. Motor vehicles accidents and dog attacks are an ever-present threat. It is so important that we learn how to balance our human needs with the needs of our treasured wildlife. The number one reason that koalas come into our care is because of a bacterial disease called Chlamydiosis.

## How is the book being funded and what will it hope to raise in funds? (G Henshaw)

The money for the print and production of the book is being raised by locals - businesses and individuals. Basically it is local crowd funding. Details have been posted on a dedicated website www.tgta.com.au. Once the books have been published - 5,000 in the first print run - they will sell at the Koala Hospital kiosk and other venues locally. The Hospital has over 200,000 visitors a year so we are hoping to sell many more books than the first print run of 5,000 which will be

printed locally. The 40 page books will sell for between \$10 and \$15 and a small amount will be set aside from every sale to pay for the reprints. It should be a very sustainable way of fund raising, as well as increasing awareness around the world of the plight of the threatened koala population in Australia. I hope your readers will jump online to the website and pledge their \$50 or \$100 or more, so the book can be printed soon.

# Clinical Director's Report

ven though the koalas of this region are definitely in decline we have had an incredible amount of admissions over the last three months. Most patients have been courtesy of chlamydia which is normal for this time of year and thankfully the amount of dog attack admissions have been very low as have been motor vehicle ones. We have also been helping out our colleagues in other licenced areas with many patients from the Hunter, North Coast and tablelands as well, as they have been "snowed under".

We are still having issues with drugs to treat the urogenital form of chlamydia successfully and this problem exists countrywide. We are considering revisiting a drug we trialled a few years ago that we had some success with, it's just an awful ongoing battle.

The recent spate of hot dry weather has brought with it the dreaded bushfires all over NSW with at one point around 60 fires recorded in the state. The Port Stephens/Karuah area copped a big high intensity fire with sadly not very many

positive outcomes. We have received two Port Stephens patients with chlamydia to try to lighten their load somewhat. We sent a team of search and rescue staff out to a big fire north of Port Macquarie (Maria River to

Kundabung) and thankfully the only koala spotted was a healthy one in some vegetation that survived. With summer upon us, we are hoping that it's a quiet one fire wise but we are not overly confident in this.

Thankfully all our bushfire search and rescue teams have recently been reaccredited by RFS a wonderful organisation we couldn't do without. The new Education display is getting close to completion and will hopefully be partially open for the Christmas holidays, with completion listed as February 2017, thanks to the efforts of our 2 professional exhibit designers. On behalf of the koalas we wish all our readers and safe, peaceful and prosperous Christmas and New Year.

#### **Future HKPS Hospital?**

OURISTS could help preserve the Port Stephens koala population at a hospital dedicated to the marsupial's care. Hunter Koala Preservation Society, is the organisation that wants to build a hospital at One Mile and has taken a keen interest in one such facility at Port Macquarie.

Thousands of tourists pass through the Port Macquarie facility which helps educate people and raise money vital to preservation activities.

"Having a hospital gives your cause a face and it's so much easier to ask for the public's support with that focal point", Port Macquarie clinical director Cheyne Flanagan said. The first Port Macquarie facility was built 30 years ago with support from its business community and service clubs like Lions and Rotary. It included outdoor yards for rehabilitation, observation areas for the public and served as a base for university vet

training and research. In turn the hospital's Koala Preservation Society members have become government advisers, work in habitat preservation and give regular talks at schools and business functions. A new facility was built in 2005 with the help of a German benefactor.

"Even having a souvenir shop and educational display helps you have a conversation with people," Ms Flanagan said. A 17-year veteran of the hospital, Ms Flanagan oversees the care of koalas brought to its doors and she estimates that only five percent need specialist veterinarian attention for X-rays and orthopaedic surgery.

Her advice to Port Stephens has been to first build a facility for treatment and the rehab yards. The observation areas for tourists to see koalas would follow with yards for koalas that can't be released from care.

"No carer wants a sick animal being on display," Ms Flanagan said. "It's an amazing thing that the Hunter Koala Preservation Society and the community are doing in Port Stephens, there's a great need for hospital there. Ms Flanagan said the stakes were high.

"National Geographic did a worldwide survey that asked people what their most iconic animals were and koalas were in their top five," she said.

"It would be shameful of us to lose an iconic species - Australia already has the highest extinction rate of mammals in the world."

But it's ok, I'm able to climb my tree and enjoy the views and I still enjoy seeing all the visitors. So you may ask, what's happened to my gorgeous Oxley Twinkles?

Well, she is now a part of an established colony and doing extremely well, she probably is even a mother.
